

LEGISLATIVE OUPDATE

Update No. 17

April 30, 2021

The 67th Legislative Assembly came to a close just past midnight on April 30th. Lawmakers were able to complete their work in 76 days, a few days short of the 80 days allotted by the ND Constitution. This means the Legislature will be able to use the remaining 4 days later this year for the legislative redistricting process. This legislative session was one for the books, to say the least. Not only did it result in the largest state budget in state history, but lawmakers also briefly paused their work in order to expel a House member for the first time.

The following are the key education-related bills impacting school boards that passed this session and will become effective on August 1st (unless otherwise noted):

HB 1388: One of the final issues to get resolved in the last few days of the session was K-12 public school funding. The Conference Committee for HB 1388 finally resolved their differences mid-week and were able to come to an agreement on the final language of the bill. HB 1388 is likely the most significant piece of education-related legislation passed this session as it establishes changes to the policy for implementing the K-12 funding formula and was the "catch-all" bill for issues germane to education. The sticking point for the conference committee came down to whether there should be an increase in the per pupil payment over the next biennium. The agreement came after several days of back and forth between the Senate members (who were pushing for a 1/1 an increase in the per pupil payment) and the House members (who did not support any increase in the per pupil payment). Senate members persisted and were able to convince the House members to agree to the 1/1 increase (\$10,136/\$10,237). You can watch a short clip of Senator Schaible, a former school board member from Mott-Regent and the current chair of the Senate Education Committee, explaining the need for the increase <u>here</u>.

In addition to the increase in the per pupil payment, HB 1388 does the following:

- Adjusts the small school district size weighting factors. School districts that do not operate a high school will have their average daily membership divided by .6 to impute an average daily membership to be on the same scale as high school district. The bill also establishes a new weighting factor for districts that have reorganized that operate 2 physical plants over 19 miles apart.
- Provides the ability of a school district to meet instructional time requirements through a virtual
 instruction program that meets certain criteria (established through administrative rules to be
 adopted by DPI). It also includes provisions to account for virtual instruction in the ADM calculation.
 The bill also includes an emergency clause regarding the virtual instruction provisions so that districts
 currently providing virtual learning may continue to do so through the end of the current school year
 and also meet instructional time requirements.
- Adds a reading competency component to the teacher licensure requirements, as well as additional requirements to reading curriculum.
- Adjusts the timing for the phase-out of moving transition maximum school districts onto the K-12 funding formula.
- Provides for a legislative management study of K-12 funding, including transition minimum reduction impacts on reorganized and consolidated school districts.

HB 1013: This is the DPI appropriation bill and includes the per pupil payment appropriation provisions based on the policy provisions in HB 1388. HB 1013 also includes a provision requiring that during the 2021-23 biennium, school boards must use an amount equal to at least 70% of all new money received by the district resulting from the 1/1 increase in the base integrated formula payment rate, to increase the compensation paid to non-administrative personnel.

<u>**HB 1027</u>**: This bill codifies the required transportation aid payments to school districts. For the 2021-22 and 2022-23 school years, transportation state aid will be calculated based on the greater of the 2018-19 mileage and rider data or previous year mileage and rider data. In subsequent school years, DPI will use the latest available student enrollment count in each school</u>

district in calculating transportation aid. The bill also prohibits DPI from distributing more than one-half of the amount appropriated for transportation aid grants for any biennium in the first year of the biennium. Finally, the bill calls for a legislative management study during the 2021-22 interim regarding the impact of additional career and technical education center student transportation on student transportation costs.

<u>HB 1015</u>: This is the OMB appropriation bill and includes an appropriation of \$70 million to the CTE department for the purpose of a statewide area career center initiative grant program. The CTE department must establish the application process and develop eligibility requirements for the grant program that include the following:

- Funding may be used only for career and technical education projects involving construction, addition, maintenance, and equipment for new and existing area career centers;
- Grants awarded to each recipient must be at least \$500,000, but may not exceed \$10,000,000;
- Grants may be awarded only to the extent a school district has secured matching funds from nonstate sources on a dollar-for-dollar basis;
- An applicant for a grant must identify sufficient future nonstate sources of funding for ongoing operating and maintenance costs associated with a new or expanded area career center;
- Preference must be given to school districts that collaborate with other school districts for a regional area career center facility or to school districts to create a new area career center or use an existing area career center to positively affect that region of the state; and
- Preference must be given to school districts that will promote postsecondary education and workforce training education in conjunction with secondary education.

SB 2215: This bill builds into NDCC chapter 15.1-16, which addresses teacher representation and negotiation, a more structured timeframe to assist school boards and teachers/administrators in their pursuit of good faith contract negotiations within a reasonable period of time. The bill includes a deadline to complete negotiations no later than July 1 unless the parties agreed otherwise. If an agreement is not reached between the parties by the deadline, an impasse exists by operation of law. The bill also adds deadlines into the recognition process that is required to be completed before negotiations may begin.

<u>HB 1356</u>: This bill requires all public schools to permit the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts access to students during school hours each school year in the fall in order to provide information and recruit students. NDSBA opposed the bill because federal law already requires public schools to provide equal access to the Boys Scouts and other youth patriotic groups if the schools choose to provide a designated open forum for other youth and community groups to present information at schools. Also, it likely will require schools to provide other groups access to the school with little ability to restrict based on content. The bill becomes law on August 1, and thus, schools will need to comply with its requirements next school year. NDSBA will send out guidance on these new requirements in the coming weeks.

SB 2308: This bill adds to the list of delineated school board powers in section 15.1-09-33 the ability to permit the display of the Ten Commandments on school property and in classrooms along with other historical documents, as well as permit the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance in their schools (which is already permitted). The bill includes a provision providing immunity to school boards and their employees for any state law claims that may be brought as a result of these issues (although any claims brought would almost certainly be based on federal constitutional grounds and the state may not provide immunity for that). NDSBA and other education stakeholder groups opposed the bill.

SB 2165: This bill removes the general ending fund balance requirements set forth in section 15.1-07-29. It also makes changes to the ending fund balance requirements set forth in section 15.1-27-35.3 relating to state aid payment calculations and delays the implementation of the requirements until July 1, 2023. Finally, it removes federal impact aid from the calculation of a district's ending fund balance.

<u>HB 1349</u>: This bill makes changes to NDCC 44-04-18.27 relating to applications for public employment and would make applications and records related to the applications exempt (rather than confidential). It further clarifies that once finalists for the position are designated, the applications and related records of the finalists are open to the public. The bill also makes changes to NDCC 44-04-20 to codify into law the ability of a public entity to hold meetings by electronic means and to provide public access by electronic means.

<u>HB 1253</u>: This bill is known as the election administration bill as it makes numerous changes to how elections are administered in the state. Most of the changes relate to county-run elections; however, a few would impact elections run by public school boards. Those include:

- Changing the date for canvassing the results of the election by the school board following a school election from the sixth day after the election to the thirteenth day after the election;
- A new section to chapter 16.1-01 of the NDCC that prohibits the state or political subdivisions (including public schools) from soliciting, accepting or using any grant or donations from private persons for elections operations or administration, except using privately owned facilities for polling places, food for poll workers and other nonmonetary donations that are not used to prepare, process, mark, collect or tabulate ballots or votes. Any individual who knowingly violates this section is guilty of a class A misdemeanor;
- Changes the requirements for absentee applications in that the application form must provide the applicant the ability to indicate specific elections in the calendar year for which the applicant wishes to vote by absentee ballot;
- The absentee application form must also include a notification that the signature on the form will be compared to the signature on the affidavit on the envelope in which the absentee ballot must be placed;
- The voter's affidavit on the front of the return envelope for an absentee ballot must also include a notice that the signature on the affidavit will be compared to the signature on the affidavit included in the application for the absentee ballot; and,
- If the election official or canvassing board has reason to suspect the signature on the application was made by a different individual than the individual who signed the voter's affidavit on the return ballot envelope, the election official must attempt to contact the absent voter as soon as practicable to provide an opportunity to validate the signatures.

SB 2332: This bill relates to the criteria for an alternative teacher license. The bill adds "special education" to the list of subject areas in which individuals with alternative licenses may teach. It also removes the sunset provision that was placed in section 15.1-13-10 last session. The bill also adds the requirement that an alternative licensing program operate in accordance with the procedures and program approval standards and requirements set by the board for teacher education programs for the licensure of educators. Finally, the bill calls for a legislative management study of alternative licensure criteria.

<u>HB 1337</u>: This bill allows a county committee, subject to the approval of the state board of public education, to transfer or donate property of a dissolving district during the dissolution process to another political subdivision for less than fair market value. The transfer or donation may only occur provided the set aside requirements in NDCC 15.1-12-28 and 15.1-12-28.1 are satisfied first.

<u>SB 2304</u>: This bill would require greater emphasis on federally recognized Indian tribes located in the state in social studies and U.S. history and North Dakota studies curriculum. The effective date for the high school graduation is August 1, 2025.

<u>SB 2311</u>: This bill requires the Department of Human Services to include in its resources on mental health awareness and suicide prevention provided to schools an evidenced-based, online virtual mental health and suicide prevention simulation-based training program.

HB 1232: This bill relates to the satisfaction of school calendar hours through virtual instruction when weather or other circumstances required a school to cancel hours of instruction or dismiss before completing all hours in a day. Schools would be required to adopt a policy providing for virtual instruction that would satisfy the requirements of section 15.1-06-04(3) as addressed in HB 1388.

<u>SB 2278</u>: This bill provides immunity for schools, school officials, and employees for COVID-19 related liability, except that which results from an individual's gross negligence or willful misconduct. The bill included an emergency clause and became law upon filing with the Secretary of State.

HB 1478: This bill permits a school board to adopt a policy to allow students in grades 6-12 to earn course credit through educational opportunities with a sponsoring entity (a.k.a. Learn Everywhere). DPI must adopt rules to administer such programs. Proposals from sponsoring entities must be approved by the local school board, the K-12 education coordination council and DPI.

A few of the above-referenced bills were passed in the last days of the session and have not yet been signed by the Governor. Please see the bill list below for status updates on all primary bills tracked by NDSBA throughout the 67th Legislative session.
